



SEA CADET CORPS



The Sea Cadet Corps (SCC) aims to help young people toward responsible adulthood and encourage them to reach their potential by developing valuable personal attributes and high standards of conduct, teamwork through challenging events to inspire confidence and the next generation of sailors using a nautical theme based on the customs and traditions of the Royal Navy.

Activities are very wide ranging but principally include all forms of boating for example: sailing, canoeing, motorboats and pulling, as well as offshore (sail and powered) and working toward Duke of Edinburgh awards and all manner of outdoor pursuits. Above all the SCC is about young people having fun, being involved in worthwhile activities and becoming better members of society as a result.

The SCC is a nationwide voluntary youth organisation open to young people aged 10 to 18. Junior Sea Cadet sections are open to young people aged 10 to 12 years of age. Those aged from 13 to 18 may also join Marine Cadet Detachments (MCD), where established within sea cadet units, as marine cadets.



The SCC is one of the operating arms of The Marine Society & Sea Cadets (MSSC) which is an incorporated registered charity. The SCC has two principal sponsors, the MSSC and the Ministry of Defence (MOD).



Sea Cadets are our future, not only because many of them go on to join the Naval Service and stay, but also because those who do not, go into their civilian lives as better citizens and with a knowledge of the maritime environment and the Naval Service.

There are around 14,000 sea cadets and 8,000 adult volunteers based in some 400 individual units around the UK. There are many ways that people leaving the service can get involved from visiting, volunteering, fund raising or even by leaving a legacy.
